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DIRECTORS NOTE

Theater can haunt you.

In general, I do not like scary stories. As a twenty-something, I went with a young lady to see Nicole Kidman in "The Others." By the time the movie's opening credits closed, I was thinking, "I shouldn't be here." The only thing that kept me seated was the fear of looking like a wimp.

That fear was not a new feeling for me. Several years earlier, I had spent a summer in London as a college freshman, taking advantage, night after night, of the steeply reduced ticket prices for students. Shakespeare, Lloyd Webber, Ibsen, Ayckbourn—I spent night after night enjoying musical and non-musical productions by titans of the stage.

But one evening, I bought a ticket to the Fortune Theatre for a play I knew nothing about, by a playwright I had never heard of: "The Woman in Black" by Stephen Mallatratt. No one else in my program wanted to join me, so I went alone.

Big mistake.

By intermission, I was so nervous I paced the lobby and weighed the pros and cons of leaving. Not wanting to have wasted my money or look like a "fraidy cat" to the strangers I sat next to (pride is a weird thing), I watched to the end.

And I'm glad I did.

It was a theatrical experience like no other. To this day, I remember that performance more clearly than any of the hundreds I have seen in my life. The writing, the acting, the atmosphere—everything added up to be much more than the sum of their parts. And the best part was that it required a level of imagination and involvement from the audience that is rarely experienced. As an audience member, I helped scare myself. And it was fun.

When I learned that the Parker Theatre was to produce this piece, I giggled. And when they asked me, about a year ago, if I would direct, I couldn't say "YES!" fast enough. Although the show ran on London's West End from June 7, 1989, until March 4, 2023, it is rarely produced in the United States, and I wanted to be part of something relatively "new" to the Salt Lake area.

Walking out of the Fortune Theatre that night 28 years ago, I looked across the lobby and saw two of my school directors. They had been there, unbeknownst to me. I glommed on to them, and whispered a prayer of thanksgiving, grateful that I didn't have to walk home through the dark London streets alone.

I hope you have a similar experience, and that this night's entertainment stands out in your memory like a torch on a dark stage.

SUMMARY

The Woman in Black, adapted by Stephen Mallatratt, is a ghostly tale of suspense centered on Arthur Kipps, a young lawyer tasked with settling the estate of the reclusive Alice Drablow at Eel Marsh House—a secluded mansion surrounded by treacherous marshlands and reachable only when the tide permits.

As Kipps works alone in the eerie house, he begins to witness unsettling occurrences and sightings of a mysterious woman dressed in black. Despite warnings from the wary villagers, who refuse to speak of her, Kipps delves deeper into the secrets hidden within the house.

He discovers a tragic story of loss, revenge, and a restless spirit bound to the house. Each encounter with the woman in black intensifies the sense of dread, drawing Kipps—and the audience—into a chilling atmosphere where the past refuses to stay buried. The play masterfully builds tension, unraveling a tale that blurs the line between the living and the dead.
